

Ladies' Gifts Cabbage Rose Hat Box and Shoe Box
Designed by Ann Lenore Vanture
to Scale for 12"-14" Dolls (1:6)

Required tools and supplies:

- X-acto knife and fresh blade
- A thin metal straight-edge ruler. Create creases by pressing against edge of the ruler.
- Tweezers, detailing scissors
- Good cutting mat (cardboard will ruin your blades)
- Fast-grab, quick-dry white craft glue that dries clear
- A glue stick
- Small piece of aluminum foil to use as a glue pot
- Slender artist's paint brush to apply glue
- 1/8" or 1/16" paper hole punch (optional)
- Pink silk ribbon for hatbox handle
- Pink tissue paper for hatbox and shoe box stuffing



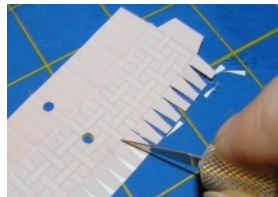
1. Cut out hatbox pieces. Use the straight-edge ruler and crease as shown along the length of tabs and lining of both the box lid and bottom.



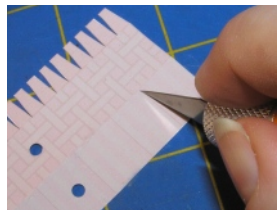
2. Use the paper hole punch and cut holes as indicated on both the lid and bottom hatbox pieces.



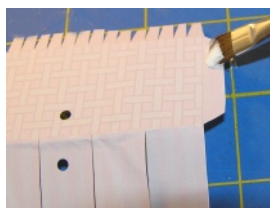
3. Next, carefully roll the hatbox lid and bottom long strips around a cylinder such as the glue stick and then release. This gives the pieces a natural curvature and will make the final assembly much easier.



4. Use the cutting tool to cut notches between tabs found on both the lid and bottom pieces.



5. Slice along indications on both the lid and bottom pieces' linings.



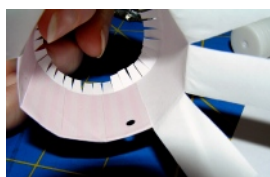
6. Paint glue to the side tab found on the box bottom and adhere it to the respective inside blank side to make a cylinder. Repeat step to the hatbox lid.



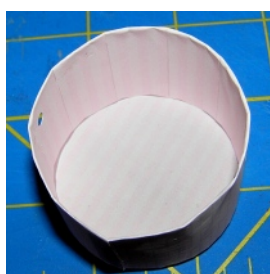
7. Outwardly splay every lining panel.



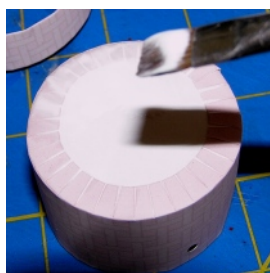
8. Use the glue stick and one-by-one glue the lining panels to the inside of the box bottom and then repeat for the box lid.



9. Try to glue each as straight as possible as shown here.



10. Glue the inside bottom surface disk against the tabs. You may like to use the glue stick first, then reinforce with the liquid glue applied with a brush from the outside. Do the same for the lid's inside disk. NOTE: always check the size of a disk before applying any glue.



11. Use the paint brush once again, and apply a layer of glue to the outside bottom of box.



12. Very carefully apply the bottom disk. Repeat steps 10 and 11 for the hatbox lid.





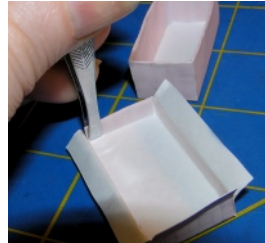
1. Cut out shoe box pieces. Use the straight-edge ruler and crease as shown for box bottom and lid.



4. Splay the lining panels outward. Paint a layer of glue to each and then fold back inward.



2. Paint glue to top surface of a tab found on the box.



5. Press bond with tweezers. Repeat these steps for the lid.



3. Press bond using the tweezers. Repeat these steps for all tabs on both the box bottom and box lid.



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
