

# book37~ Vintage Kitchen Cupboard Collection Assembly Instructions (1:12)



Products in tutorial may look different from yours, but are constructed identically to yours. Several items not shown in photo, but instructions are included here.

## Required tools and supplies:

- X-acto knife and fresh blade
- A thin metal straightedge ruler. Make fold lines by pressing against edge of the ruler.
- Small detailing scissors, tweezers
- Good cutting mat. Cardboard will ruin your blade and your project.
- Fast-grab, quick-dry white craft glue that dries clear
- Small piece of aluminum foil to use as a glue pot
- Slender artist's paintbrush to apply glue
- Acid free glue stick
- Sewing needle (thin) and neutral colored sewing thread.
- Edging tape/ribbon for apron

## • Optional:

1/4" inch round paper punch and if you can find a 1/3" punch

You can print these tutorial pages. However, leaving the tutorial on your screen allows you to zoom in closely on the photos.



## Food Cans:

1. Roll can body around a cylinder such as a paint brush handle. Glue edge and remove from cylinder.
2. Glue top and bottom to cans. Before gluing you might want to use a color gray pen to cover the raw white edge of the paper. From here on out, color the raw paper edges of the paper parts with colored pens. This will give your pieces a nice finished look.
3. You have been given some spare tops just in case you mis-cut.

## Boxed Products:

1. Cut boxes then use a thin metal edged ruler to fold against and create perfect creases.
2. Use the paint brush and fast grab, quick dry craft glue to paint glue along the box's side tab.
3. Close up the ends and glue shut.

## Cook Books:

1. Cut covers and strips of pages. Don't mix-up the pages from the covers. Keep the respective cover with it's strip of pages.
2. Fan fold the strips of pages.

3. Glue pages together with a strip of glue stick. These cook books will be displayed closed.
3. Fold the covers at each side of the spines using a metal edged ruler.
4. Glue cover to respective stack of pages.

#### Sugar and Potato Bags:

1. Fold a bag printed sides together. Whip-stitch the bottom and side length. Turn right sides out.
2. Fill with innocuous substance like clean sand or beads. Putting a food substance in the bag may attract bugs over the years.
3. Whip stitch the top of the bag closed.



#### Fabric Items:

Some sewing skills required.

1. Fold down top of apron and stitch for a finished edge.
2. Use bias tape to outline sides and bottom. Make certain to add extra length of tape to the top and going out the sides for neck tie and waist tie.
3. Hand towels require fringing each end. Take a pin and carefully extract horizontal threads to desired length of fringe.
4. Hem sides, or merely fold sides in and stitch towel to the rod. This help to make the towel stay down and not pop up.



Photo is of a similar set. I basted around the apron and put bias tape (ribbon) strategically for strap and tie.



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
