

**bookfd9: Be My Valentine
(Cabbage Rose Millinery)
1:6 fasion/play scale**



Required tools and supplies:

- X-acto knife and fresh blade. Projects can be cut with scissors if you prefer.
- A thin metal straightedge ruler can be used to make fold lines by pressing against edge of the ruler.
- Tweezers are good for holding and pressing glue bonds.
- A cotton swab is also a useful tool for pressing glue bonds.
- Use a good cutting mat. Cardboard used as a substitute cutting mat will ruin your blade and your project will have rough edges.
- The best glue to use is a fast-grab, quick-dry, white craft glue that dries clear. Regular craft glue is too soupy to be of help here.
- An acid-free glue stick comes in handy, but only use when specified.
- A small piece of aluminum foil makes a good disposable glue pot.
- A slender artist's paintbrush is a good tool to use to apply glue. Wash the brush in clear water when not in use. Some prefer to use a toothpick, but a brush will give you much more control.
- tissue paper, small pom-pom for powder box, various jewelry fittings for pom-pom and optional perfume bottle, embroidery floss for the fan, thin pink ribbon (1/16" if you can find it) for the hat box, portfolio and clutch.

Products in tutorial may look different from yours, but are constructed identically to yours.

Leaving the tutorial on your screen allows you to zoom in closely on the photos.

Lined Round Hat Boxes


1. Cut out pieces.



2. Roll side pieces around a pen like item. This gives the hat box a nice curve to it.



3. Cut along lining panel's ribs. Also cut little tabs found on the opposite side.



4. Fold tabs and lining panels along straight edge ruler. I have the ruler secured with clamps.




5. Glue side tab on box to make a cylinder. Do the same for the lid. Paint glue with a brush. Use the quick-grab, fast-dry craft glue.



6. Fold down and glue lining panels to interior of box. A glue stick may work more easily for you, although the panels may pop free later on.



7. Repeat step for lid.





8. Glue inside round disks into box and lid. This will keep the shape of the hat box perfectly round. first, make certain the disks fit and do not need trimming.



9. Glue bottom panel in place with brush.



10. Glue top panel in place with brush.




Bow Maker

This works for both the hat boxes and stationery caddy.

1. Glue the tacks and nails as shown with heavy duty glue. The nails are about 3/4" apart. The nails do not need to be the same length, as you can see from this sample.




2. Center the first piece of 1/16" ribbon and poke onto tacks as shown. This piece will tie around the middle of the bow to hold it secure. You can make this piece any length you desire.




3. Next take the end of another ribbon and poke onto the left tack as shown.



4. Take the ribbon and create a figure "8" pattern on the two nails. Three loops per side is the size this tutorial uses.



5. When you are done making figure "8s", secure the tail end of the ribbon by poking it on the right side's tack.



6. Next, slip the first ribbon from it's tacks, and tie a tight knot at the center point of the bow. The bow is now complete and you can remove it from the other two tacks. Slide the bow from the nail shafts. Don't cut the tails until you know for certain how much you need to secure the bow.



7. This is a sample bow.

Desk Caddy

1. Fold the main piece of the desk caddy at all fold lines. You will see a box shape appear when folds are in place.



2. Use the artist's brush and paint glue to side tabs found on box shape. Use tweezers to press down glued seams.

3. Fold down and glue the lining panels found at the top perimeter edge. This gives the top edges a finished appearance.



4. Take the base piece. Fold in half and glue blank sides together. Center panel under box bottom and glue into place.

Stationery

1. Assembly is straight-forward. Cut out pieces of violets stationery sheets. Stack neatly.




2. For the envelopes, fold in all four corners. Secure the bottom three with a dot of glue. When dry you can take a knife and separate if the glue has glued the triangles to the inside.




3. Use the strap included or make a bow to secure the set. Caddy in violet theme is not included.



Shoe Box



1. Cut and fold pieces.



2. Glue corner tabs



3. Secure Tabs with tweezers.




4. Paint glue to interfacing panels and fold inward. Press tightly with tweezers.




Shopping Bag

1. Cut out all pieces. Fold handles lengthwise along fold lines--triple thick.



2. Fold handles so they are 3 layers thick. Glue the entire length of each handle so that the end result is two long, fully lined handles.




Not shown: After the handles dry, roll handles around shafted tool such as a pen or pencil. This will help you get a natural curve to your handle.

3. Take first handle and glue **ONE** end to blank inner surface of the bag. See the tic marks on the printed side for handle positioning. Allow to dry.

4. Glue the other end of handle when first position has dried. Repeat these steps for other side.



5. Fold bag piece against straight edge to get nice creases. Slather a layer of glue to the long side tab. Use tweezers to press bond between tab and side of bag.



6. Place glue to two small tabs on bottom of bag. Press long panels to them.



Tissue Bag Stuffer

1. Tissue panel should be approximately 12-18 times the depth of the side of the bag and 2.5 times the bag height.

2. Take tissue and fold lengthwise. make one side slightly wider than the other, unlike the photo.



3. Fan-fold length of doubled tissue.



4. Staple base of fan-fold length.



5. Separate folded halves of tissue to create fluff and volume.

6. Place tissue in bag part way.

7. Use a toothpick to gently press down stuffing into the bag, so as not to smash the fluff.



Toiletries

1. Follow the photos for assembling bottle and puff. Fittings may vary slightly due to market availability.

2. Use bonding glue for fittings and baubles.

3. Cut pins with wire cutters if necessary. Be careful not to let cut end fly.



Powder Box and Puff

1. Glue bead to puff.
2. Fold the box's 8 panels and the lid's 8 panels.
3. Use a straightedge to fold the tab line on both the box and lid.
4. Glue side tabs found on both lid and box.
5. Glue inside facing into the interior of both the top and bottom pieces. It is important to do this before gluing the outside panels!
6. Glue lid's top panel onto tabs and glue bottom panel onto tabs.



Perfume Box

1. The box is straightforward. There are a couple of perfume labels if you elect to make the perfume bottles as described above.




Sachet Packets

1. Assemble as shown.
2. Bundle them into the band and glue band.



Tassel Tutorial

The photos and instructions are for a 1:12 scale tassel. You will want to almost double lengths and number of strands of embroidery floss for 1:6 scale.



Hand Fan Layout Pattern

Required tools and supplies: Tweezers, detailing scissors (embroidery snips), black office binder clip, large-eyed needle, embroidery floss



1. Pull off three long strand off of a piece of embroidery floss and set aside. Cut the remaining piece into 3, 2" lengths.



2. Fold the three lengths in half and pinch into the black binder clip. The folded center should be exposed.



3. Take one of the long strands and tie together at the center of the fold. It is easier to handle if you thread it with the needle and then do the work.



4. Now take the rest of the threaded strand and tie around the bundle to make a tassel head.

5. Take the toothpick and use it to separate and untwist the strands.



6. Snip the bottom ends of the tassel to make a nice clean straight line.

7. Take the loose piece at top of tassel and thread it through the fan panels holed. Tie pretty tightly.



Clutch


1. Cut out and fold portfolio as shown.

2. Here is how it looks with folds

3. Paint glue to the 4 long side tabs.

4. Use tweezers to

5. Glue a length of ribbon to the middle of the base of the clutch. Glue a length of ribbon to the middle underside of the opening flap. Let dry. Here is how the portfolio looks with the ribbon tied.



1. Cut out all pieces. Press against the ruler to make folds as shown in the photo.

2. Here is the project with all folds made.

3. Use the small artist's brush with glue to glue down the perimeter edges, including the little one between the folder's pockets. As you will see I forgot mine! Do not glue pockets at this time.

4. Take the tweezers and press the perimeter's edges.

5. Draw a line across the folder above where the pockets will land. Glue the ribbon along that line.

6. Glue the lining panel centered to the inside. Notice the little tab that didn't get glued down...it should have been glued down in step 3.



7. Glue down the pockets' respective tabs.



8. As shown here, use the ruler to make the bend on either side of the spine.



9. Place an invitation (or thank you card) in the center of an envelope, fold as shown.



10. Place a dot of glue on the two bottom flaps and press. If you accidentally glue flaps to the back of the envelope, take your blade tool and slice the bond free.



11. There is no need to explain the other "stuffers". Fill the pockets with your wedding items. Tie it shut with a bow.
